


ABOULELA, LEILA Lyrics Alley




A lyrical and deeply moving novel by a twice Orange-listed rising star, set in pre-Independence Sudan, Egypt and post-war Britain.

ADICHIE, CHIMAMANDA NGOZI Half of a Yellow Sun





ADIGA, ARAVIND The White Tiger





AMIS, MARTIN Time's Arrow






ATKINSON, KATE Not the End of the World





BAKKER, GERBRAND The Twin





BROOKMYRE, CHRISTOPHER A Big Boy Did it and Ran Away





CHEVALIER, TRACY The Lady and the Unicorn




Tracy Chevalier's fourth novel about a set of six medieval tapestries, each one full of mystery and fated paths.


DUNMORE, HELEN Mourning Ruby


DUNN, SUZANNAH Venus Flaring


FABER, MICHEL Under the Skin

Under the Skin introduces Isserley, a woman obsessed with picking up male hitchhikers - so long as they're well-muscled and alone. But why?




FALLADA, HANS Alone in Berlin

FAULKS, SEBASTIAN On Green Dolphin Street




FLAGG, FANNIE Welcome to the World, Baby Girl


FRANZEN, JONATHAN The Corrections

FREUD, ESTHER Hideous Kinky




HALL, STEVEN The Raw Shark Texts


HISLOP, VICTORIA The Island


MCEWAN, IAN Saturday


MARTEL, YANN Life of Pi

MAWER, SIMON The Glass Room

Inspired by a real house, this is the tale of the people that come and go from Landauer House over the years as it passes from Czech to Russian hands. Shortlisted for the Booker Prize, it follows Mawer's previous novels The Gospel of Judas, The Fall and Swimming to Ithaca.




MEEK, JAMES The People's Act of Love

In the outer reaches of a Siberian country lives a small Christian sect. Stationed in their midst is a company of Czech soldiers. Into this community trudges Samarin, an escapee from a Russian prison. His arrival intrigues many, including Anna Petrovna, a war widow, but when a shaman is found dead, suspicion and terror engulf the little town...



MITCHELL, DAVID Cloud Atlas

A voyager crossing the Pacific in 1850; a composer blagging a livelihood in between-the-wars Belgium; a journalist in 70s California; a publisher fleeing his gangland creditors; a 'dinery server' on death-row; and Zachry, a young Pacific Islander witnessing the nightfall of science and civilisation - the narrators of Cloud Atlas hear each other's echoes down the corridor of history.




MOORE, WENDY Wedlock – How Georgian Britain's Worst Husband Met his Match

The remarkable story of the Countess of Strathmore and her marriage to Andrew Robinson Stoney. It was a brutal one, and when she filed for divorce and was subsequently kidnapped, it became the scandal of the day. This account of an 18th century woman's fight for liberty and justice is told with great verve by the author of The Knife Man, who is comparable to Alison Weir with her populist touch.



MORTENSON, GREG Three Cups of Tea

In an attempt to climb K2, Greg Mortenson became lost in the mountains of Pakistan, and was rescued by local villagers. Struck by their kindness and their poverty, he decided to return and build a school. But his project has burgeoned, and now more than 60 schools have been built across Pakistan and Afghanistan. This true story was a New York Times bestseller.



MORTON, KATE The House at Riverton

Within these four walls lay a secret that would last a lifetime. A novel about love, loss and long-buried family secrets.


Labyrinth

Alice is a young British woman working on an archaeological dig in the south of France when she discovers a cave which has been hiding secrets for centuries. The story then jumps back 800 years when another young woman, Alais, has to protect an ancient book that contains the secrets of the Holy Grail. 
MURAKAMI, HARUKI After Dark


MYERSON, JULIE Something Might Happen


NAFISI, AZAR Reading Lolita in Tehran

A lost masterpiece written in France in 1941, telling the story of a group of characters living under the Nazi occupation. The author died in Auschwitz in 1942, and was awarded the prestigious Prix Renaudot in 2005 - the first time that the prize has been awarded posthumously.




NICHOLLS, DAVID One Day

From being a celebrity in the 90's to having a boss with a large beard, nothing is shied away from in this big pot of life. This book follows every 15th July from 1988 (end of their studentship) to near present day in the lives of two characters; Emma and Dexter, and their relationship with each other and others.




NIFFENEGGER, AUDREY The Time Traveler's Wife

This extraordinary, magical novel is the story of Clare and Henry who have known each other since Clare was 6 and Henry was 36, and were married when Clare was 22 and Henry 30. Impossible but true, because Henry is one of the first people diagnosed with Chrono-Displacement Disorder: periodically his genetic clock resets and he finds himself pulled suddenly into his past or future



ONDAATJE, MICHAEL Divisadero

From the author of The English Patient. Beginning in 1970s northern California, it follows the lives of a makeshift family who are split apart by an incident of violence. A story of possession and loss, and the discordant demands of love and memory. Plumply imagined, deeply romantic but vividly traumatic.


The Tenderness of Wolves

Winner of the Costa First Novel Award, this is an extraordinary debut, a panoramic epic combining murder mystery, adventure and romance, and powerfully evoking the harsh environment of an isolated settlement in Canada, 1867. Exhilarating in its scope and quality.



PETTERSON, PER Out Stealing Horses

In 1948, when he is fifteen, Trond spends a summer in the country with his father. The events - the accidental death of a child, his best friend's feelings of guilt and eventual disappearance, his father's decision to leave the family for another woman - will change his life forever.



PULLMAN, PHILIP The Northern Lights

'Without this child, we shall all die'. Lyra Belacqua and her animal daemon live half-wild and carefree among scholars of Jordan College, Oxford. The destiny that awaits her will take her to the frozen lands of the Arctic, where witch-clans reign and ice-bears fight. Her journey will have immeasurable consequences far beyond her own world.




ROY, ARUNDHATI The God of Small Things

Arundhati Roy's phenomenal debut novel, which beat the favourites to the 1997 Booker Prize, and emerged as something of a surprise winner. A witty and magical piece of work, it describes the lives of two twins growing up in a factory in Kerala, southern India amidst an extended and chaotically dysfunctional family. Roy has intimated that this may be her first and last novel.




ROBERTSON, JAMES The Testament of Gideon Mack

If the devil didn't exist, would man have to invent him? For Gideon Mack, faithless minister, unfaithful husband and troubled soul, the existence of God, let alone the Devil, is no more credible than that of ghosts or fairies. Until the day he falls into a gorge and is rescued by someone who might just be Satan himself.



RUSHDIE, SALMAN Midnight's Children

Saleem Sinai was born at midnight, the midnight of India's independence, and found himself handcuffed to history by the coincidence. He is one of 1,001 children born at the midnight hour, each of them endowed with an extraordinary talent. This is a family saga set against the background of the India of the 20th century.




RUSHDIE, SALMAN The Enchantress of Florence

A young European traveler calling himself 'Mogor dell 'Amora', the Mughal of Love arrives at the court of Emperor Akbar. The stranger claims to be the child of a lost Mughal princess, the youngest sister of Akbar's grandfather Babar, Qara Koz, a great beauty believed to possess powers of enchantment and sorcery.



SANSOM, C.J. Winter in Madrid

1940: The Spanish Civil War is over, and Madrid lies ruined. Into this uncertain world comes Harry Brett: a traumatised veteran of Dunkirk turned reluctant spy for the British Secret Service. In a depiction of wartime Spain, this work is a tale, which offers a sense of history unfolding, and the impact of impossible choices.

What happens when Deadline Maximo Afonso, a 38-year-old professor of history, discovers that there is a man living in the same city who is identical to him on every physical detail, but not related by blood at all. And what happens when each of these men attempt to investigate each other's lives?





SCHLINK, BERNARD The Reader


An exceptionally powerful novel exploring the themes of betrayal, guilt and memory against the background of the Holocaust. An international bestseller.



SHAFFER, MARY ANN The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society

The characters are thoroughly engaging and Mary Ann Shaffer (although born in the USA) manages to capture the


Hotel World

Within ten years, he amasses a great fortune, learns the ways of the samurai, and, on the other side of the law, brings about the overthrow of the Shogu


The Little Friend

TRAPIDO, BARBARA Frankie and Stankie



The Little Stranger



The Cutting Room


